

The Evolution of the Gaddi Bride's Traditional Attire: Impact of Globalization and Cultural Integration

ABSTRACT

This research investigates the evolution of the traditional bridal attire, known as Luanchri, among the Gaddi tribe in the Himalayas, focusing on the impact of globalisation and cultural integration. The Gaddi tribe, known for its unique customs and rich cultural legacy, has witnessed a substantial shift in its customs due to increased contact with other cultures. Initially representing cultural identity and legacy, the Luanchri has changed to represent broader socio-cultural dynamics.

Historically, the Luanchri represented the social structure and cultural ethos of the Gaddi tribe and went beyond simple clothing. When worn with traditional silver jewellery, it symbolizes the bride's ties to her heritage and the group identity of the community. However, the traditional form of Luanchri has experienced significant changes due to the onset of globalization and the widespread influence of Western culture. This study investigates the subtleties of these modifications, looking at the how and why of the traditional clothing's alterations.

The study is divided into multiple important sections. The Gaddi tribe's background is given in the first section, highlighting Luanchri's cultural significance.

In the second section, the effects of globalization are examined, and the major variables influencing the Luanchri's transformation are identified. Exposure to international fashion trends, the media's influence, greater mobility, and cross-cultural unions are examples of this. The study collects qualitative data through interviews with Gaddi brides, elders, and cultural experts to understand the community's perspectives on these changes.

The third portion examines how the Luanchri have been adapted in modern times. It looks at how modern Gaddi brides combine traditional styles with cutting-edge designs to create a hybrid look that honours their ethnic background and expresses

their individuality. The effects of these modifications on identity and cultural preservation are also covered in this section.

The findings' wider sociocultural ramifications are covered in the final section. It looks at the conflict that exists between modernization and cultural preservation, the significance of cultural identity in a worldwide society, and possible solutions for preserving cultural legacy while accepting new influences.

INTRODUCTION

Himachal Pradesh is home to various tribes. Among these, the 'Gaddi' tribe stands out as one of the oldest and culturally significant tribe, primarily found in the regions of Kangra, Mandi, Chamba and some parts of Jammu in Jammu and Kashmir. The abode of the Gaddis, i.e. Bharmour, Chamba, is deeply rooted in their customs, which are intricately linked to the region's natural wilderness and religious convictions. Gaddis primary occupation is shepherds and their culture is richly expressed in artisanal methods, festivals, language, and clothing. It is admirable how committed the Gaddi family is to upholding their culture.

Artisanal techniques, festivals, language, and attire are all rich expressions of Gaddi culture. The tribe's enduring ride in their past is demonstrated by festivals like Lohri, Basoa, Sair, Nuala (Shiv Pujan) and Mani Mahesh Jatra where folk music and dancing honour their shared ideals. The dedication of the Gaddi family to maintaining their tradition is quite admirable.

Gaddi culture, jewellery is highly valued, particularly by women. Jewellery is very important in the Gaddi society, especially for women. Chanderahar, a beautifully carved silver necklace, Balu/nath (big gold nose ring), and Chiri (forehead ornament made of silver with meenakari work) are ornamental and represent marital status and family pride. These ornaments are typically worn with traditional clothes, showing the tribe's creativity and cultural ties.

Luanchri is a fundamental aspect of Gaddi culture and is more than just an item of apparel worn at weddings; it is a powerful representation of purity, continuity, and identity. The great artistic heritage of the community is reflected in Luanchri's elaborate craftsmanship, vivid colour schemes, and pairing with elaborate jewellery. Due to outside pressures from globalisation, Luanchri's design, use, and cultural importance have all changed. An important cultural symbol that Gaddi brides typically wear on their wedding day is the Luanchri. The Luanchri have represented marriage transitions historically along with community ideals, and purity. Each design element of the attire reflects regional influences and historical narratives tied to the Gaddi tribe's agricultural and nomadic lifestyle.

Globalisation has brought about economic opportunities and cross-cultural interactions and put a strain on Indigenous customs by introducing modern aesthetics and global fashion trends. For example, Luanchri's design and use have changed significantly due to the desire for lighter and more comfortable materials and the impact of foreign culture. These changes, driven by a developing xenocentric preference—valuing exterior styles over traditional designs, raise questions about the loss of authenticity and cultural identity, even though they are a normal part of evolution.

This study examines how the Luanchri changed in response to these outside influences. It investigates how sociological and economic elements—such as media, intercultural communication, and changing public preferences—impact its evolution. This study emphasises the importance of the Luanchri as a cultural artefact, a symbol of the Gaddi community's identity and legacy, and its wider ramifications for the same.

The paper adds to the conversation on cultural preservation, identity, and the tenacity of traditional practices in a globalised society through qualitative research that includes interviews with Gaddi brides, artisans, and cultural specialists. To make sure that the Luanchri is a living expression of the Gaddi tribe's legacy for future generations, it emphasizes the challenges and opportunities of striking a balance between tradition and modern world.

Problem Statement

Luanchri represents Gaddi culture's rich cultural past and deep-rooted traditions. However, with the impact of globalization and increasing xenocentric taste for fresh, globalized bridal styles, Gaddi ladies are increasingly choosing for contemporary wedding dress over Luanchri. These changes due to xenocentric approach brings the change in cultural perspectives, along with that also raises questions about the Gaddi community's authenticity and cultural identity in a Globalised world.

Research Objectives

1. To investigate the Luanchri's cultural and historical relevance within the Gaddi tribe.
2. To understand the responses of the Gaddi community—brides, artisans, and cultural stakeholders—to these changes.
3. To investigate the effects of these changes on the tribe's cultural continuity and feeling of identity through Luanchri and how can it be preserved

Significance of the Study

1. **Cultural Preservation:** By exploring evolving traditions and preserving the traditional elements of Luanchri amidst the socio-cultural changes this research will provide insights into how such practices can be maintained for future generations.
2. **Filling Knowledge Gaps:** Existing literature offers a limited exploration of the direct effects of globalization on the Gaddi bride's traditional attire and how this impacts their cultural identity. This study will close this gap and investigate these changes by including viewpoints from brides, craftspeople, local communities, and cultural preservationists.
3. **Contribution to Cultural Studies:** This study will connect the intersection of cultural exchange with tradition and modernity within the Gaddi context and add to the growing discourse in anthropology, cultural studies, and textile studies.
4. **Practical Implications:** Understanding the transformations in bridal attire will also have practical implications for artisans, policymakers, and cultural preservationists working to support Gaddi traditions through education, advocacy, or community projects. Insights from this research can help inform strategies to promote cultural sustainability and heritage education.
5. **Strengthening Regional Voices:** By giving them a forum to express their opinions on cultural change and maintaining customs, the study aims to provide Gaddi brides, craftspeople, and local communities a voice. This can expand knowledge of their lived experiences in the contemporary world and strengthen community-based solutions.
6. **Contributing to Fashion Studies:** Offering insights into the interplay between traditional and contemporary bridal fashion will contribute to the Fashion industry and studies.

This research is significant as along with academic understanding, it also creates curiosity among the Gaddi community through surveys and interviews, fostering awareness and intellectual engagement.

LITERATURE REVIEW

The tension between cultural preservation and the forces of globalisation is a recurring theme in contemporary research. This dynamic is examined by Mohyeddin (2024), who observes that globalisation has two effects on traditional practices: fostering homogenisation through dominant global norms and enabling hybridity by blending old and new elements. His analysis of the Gaddi tribe's Luanchri, a traditional bridal gown, illustrates this intersection. While xenocentric bridal fashion preferences challenge its significance, modified versions incorporating contemporary aesthetics signify cultural adaptation rather than erasure.

Moten (2011) critiques the approach that views tradition and modernity as oppositional. He emphasises how traditions are dynamic and adaptable, upholding core principles while incorporating contemporary elements. This viewpoint is consistent with the growth and progress of the Luanchri, where a careful balance between adaptation to culture and preservation is achieved by combining local customs and traditions with influences from all over the world. Moten also challenges the Eurocentric lens of modernisation theories, advocating for the agency of communities like the Gaddi tribe in redefining their traditions.

Faiz (2023) examines cultural identity as a dynamic construct shaped by globalisation, and colonial legacies. His art focuses on various influences that converge to create original expressions through the hazards of cultural homogeneity and the potential of hybridity. This dichotomy sheds important light on cultural artefacts like how Luanchri changed while preserving their cultural identity and capturing contemporary trends. For example, Faiz employs frameworks such as "glocalisation" to explain this negotiation of identity in global contexts.

Adams and Goldbard (2001) support shared cultural development as a counter-commodification strategy. Their emphasis on inclusion and regional agency creates the framework for preserving traditions like the Luanchri. Community-driven initiatives that celebrate and adapt traditional practices to modern demands can promote cultural diversity and economic sustainability, mitigating the homogenising effects of globalisation.

Babar (2016) underlines the structural issues that Indigenous people confront, such as marginalisation and cultural relocation as a result of development and globalisation. His observations on the erosion of ethnic identities and local crafts are somewhat related to the Gaddi community's effort to preserve the Luanchri in the face of changing trends. Babar advice community involvement and skill development for maintaining traditional crafts while embracing innovation as it provides practical tactics.

A comprehensive framework for cultural shifts in the context of a globalized world is offered by Berry's (2008) acculturation theory. He discusses integration as it permits communities to maintain their distinct cultural history while embracing global identity and customs. This approach is quite similar to the Luanchri, who represent innovation, continuity and demonstrate how cultural symbols can change without losing their core meaning.

The impact of international media on tribal tribes' cultural identities is examined by Kamran et al. (2023). His findings provide a lens through which to view how younger

Gaddi women blend traditional attire with foreign bridal patterns, illustrating how several generations respond to globalisation.

This study focuses on the changing discourse on culture and modern influence, particularly in the context of globalisation. The Luanchri shows the dynamic interaction of cultural preservation and adaptation, promoting a better knowledge of how communities respond to the benefits and challenges of modern globalisation.

Research Gap

While studies examine globalisation and its impact on tribal communities and erosion of cultural identity among them, minimal research explicitly addresses the Gaddi tribe, its cultural practices, and its traditional attire like the Luanchri. The Gaddi tribe's unique socio-cultural identity and its response to modern influences remain underexplored in the academic discourse on globalisation.

While global and national narratives of fashion evolution are well-documented, there is a noticeable gap in representing regional and indigenous fashion—particularly bridal attire—in the larger discourse on identity preservation. This gap limits understanding of how local communities negotiate cultural identities in a globalised world.

The role of xenocentric attitudes—a growing preference for external trends over indigenous traditions—is underexplored in existing literature. The influence of such attitudes on adopting modern bridal trends among Gaddi brides is an area that requires further investigation.

METHODOLOGY

Research Design

The evolution of the Luanchri and its social effects within the Gaddi community are examined in this study using a qualitative research design. A qualitative research method was chosen.

Data Collection Methods

Data were gathered through Google form surveys and qualitative interviews to achieve the study's objectives. This two-pronged approach of surveys and interviews was chosen so that the viewpoint of both the parties who are wearing Luanchri and those who are observing can be noted. It ensured a complete picture by recording individual stories and broader community tendencies. The open-ended approach of the interviews improved the structured surveys by facilitating the identification of novel perspectives and recurring themes.

Sampling Method

The sample included:

Gaddi Brides or soon to be brides: aged 18 to 45, had recently worn /or planning to wear the Luanchri or opted for alternative bridal attire.

Community Elders: Recognised community leaders within the Gaddi community.

Participants were chosen from the Gaddi regions of Kangra, Mandi, Chamba, and Jammu region of Jammu and Kashmir to guarantee variation in age, gender, and geography. There were 144 volunteers in all, guaranteeing representation from various demographic groups.

Surveys using Google Forms

The survey was conducted using Google forms including Semi-structured, Open-ended Interviews. Interviews were conducted with two primary groups:

- Brides and soon-to-be brides: Participants addressed their own Luanchri experiences, including what they wore, the explanations for their loyalty to or departure from customs, and the effect of cultural and social factors. This study investigated the reasons behind brides' growing preference for contemporary styles. Motivations, attitudes toward tradition, and how cultural and personal factors impact their choices.
- Community Members: This survey aimed to capture community opinions on shifting preferences for the Luanchri. The main focus themes were cultural significance, the effects of globalisation, and opinions on modern adaptations.

Ethical Considerations

Ethical research practices were rigorously followed. All subjects gave their informed consent, and the study was conducted confidentially. To preserve the dignity of participants, sensitivity and respect were prioritised during interviews.

Secondary Data Analysis

Secondary sources were looked at with a view as an addition to the primary data:

- Archival Research: Historical texts, articles, and reports on Gaddi culture and the Luanchri's significance were examined to place the clothing in the context of the tribe's culture.
- Media and Digital Platforms: To comprehend contemporary representations and adaptations, social media posts and accounts exhibiting Gaddi bridal trends, such as "himbhoosha," "himachaliguide," "shethegaddan," and "gaddi shepherds," were analysed.

Limitations

This study acknowledges the following limitations:

- Tracing the Luanchri's evolution was difficult due to the need for written history.

- While the survey captures the influence of Globalisation on Gaddi traditional wear, the survey could not capture the opinions of Gaddi people who are less educated and affluent due to logistical challenges.
- Reaching certain participants was challenging due to their remote locations inside the Gaddi areas as shown in Fig.5

RESULTS AND DISCUSSIONS

Data analysis based on preferences of brides and brides to be

1. Demographics of Respondents

- Sample size : 61 brides and soon to be brides




Fig.6 Chart generated from the survey showing the age group of the respondents who are majorly brides or brides to be

- Age Groups: 67% were between 26 and 35 years, 20% were 18-25 and 36–45 years contributed 13% as shown in Fig. 6
- Marital Status: 58% married and 42% about to get married




Fig.7 Chart generated from the survey showing Educational Background of the respondents

- Educational Background: Over 70% of respondents had completed postgraduate studies, showcasing an educated demographic as shown in Fig.7

2. Wedding Locations and Attire Choices

- Wedding Settings: 72% weddings occurred in towns or small cities while the remainder occurred in traditional village settings (28%)
- Attire Preferences:
 - Traditional Luanchri: 45% of respondents chose to wear a traditional Luanchri. Refer Fig 10
 - Modern Bridal Wear: 12% preferred modern attire. Refer Fig 11
 - Fusion Attire: 43% combined traditional with modern elements, indicating a shift towards hybrid aesthetics. Refer Fig 12




Fig.8 Chart generated from the survey showing the location of the wedding




Fig.9 Chart generated from the survey showing the location of the wedding

3. Influencing Factors for Attire Selection

- Cultural and Traditional Significance: Ranked as the most critical factor Modern
- Trends: Only 15% cited modern fashion influences as a major factor.
- Availability and cost influenced 21% of decisions.

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4. Modern Trends and Cultural Preservation

Perception of the Luanchri:

- 60% of respondents considered the Luanchri* "extremely important" as a cultural symbol.
- 30% viewed it as "somewhat important," while 10% were neutral or indifferent.

Modern Influences:

- 52% acknowledged minimal influence from modern bridal trends.
- 28% reported significant influence, suggesting an increasing blend of modern aesthetics.




Fig.13 Chart showing what influenced the respondent's choice

5. Influences Shaping Bridal Attire Preferences

- Family Traditions: Influenced 57% of respondents.
- Social Media: Platforms like Instagram and Pinterest impacted 34%, highlighting globalization's role in shaping preferences.
- Peer Trends: Contributed to the choices of 9%, demonstrating secondary influences.




Fig.14 Chart showing the percentage of whether modern bridal trends influenced the respondent's decision

6. Views on Modernizing the Luanchri




Fig.16 Chart showing the perception of the gaddans on support for Modernization

- Support for Modernization. Ref Fig 16
 - 65% agreed that integrating modern elements could preserve tradition while appealing to younger generations.
 - 22% expressed concerns about losing authenticity.
 - 13% opposed modernization, emphasizing cultural identity preservation.




Fig.17 Chart showing the challenges in preserving Luanchri

- Challenges. Ref Fig 17
 - 70% identified the dominance of modern fashion trends as a significant challenge.
 - 15% mentioned the decline in artisan availability, while 15% highlighted high costs.

7. Preservation Strategies




Fig.18 Chart showing different methods opted by the respondents to preserve Luanchri

Respondents proposed several strategies to sustain the Luanchri: Ref Fig 18

- **Modernizing Designs:** Suggested by 40% to enhance youth appeal while retaining cultural essence.
- **Promotion Through Festivals:** Advocated by 30%, emphasizing community-driven awareness.
- **Government/NGO Support:** 20% prioritized financial and policy support for artisans.
- **Education and Awareness:** Highlighted by 10%, focusing on cultural education in schools and community programs.

8. Encouraging Future Generations

Encouragement for Wearing the Luanchri:

- 55% strongly encouraged future brides to embrace the Luanchri.
- 35% supported it with modern adaptations, reflecting a balanced approach.

- 10% remained neutral, showcasing varying levels of cultural attachment.

9. Narratives from Open-Ended Responses

Qualitative insights emphasized:

- **Pride in Tradition:** Many respondents articulated the Luanchri's role as a symbol of identity.
- **Concerns about Homogenization:** Some feared the dilution of distinct Gaddi cultural elements due to global influences.
- **Calls for Artisan Support:** A recurring theme was the need for financial and institutional backing to sustain traditional crafts.

DISCUSSION

The findings emphasize the interaction between tradition and modern influence in Gaddi's traditional bridal attire which is not seen much except for two indigenous brands in the state. Although Luanchri is still a beloved icon, its adaption to current fashion reveals greater cultural linkages. The tremendous effect of social media emphasizes the community's exposure to global aesthetics, yet the continuation of family traditions demonstrates resilience.

Preservation initiatives must address issues like as current fashion domination and artisan shortage through creativity and institutional assistance. Integrating modern elements while maintaining traditional authenticity can help preserving the Luanchri without losing core principle. Thus, a multi-stakeholder approach involving artisans, designers, and policymaker and community members is crucial for sustaining this heritage. Along with this, majority of the respondent's decision was influenced by the social media, hence more promotion and awareness and content related to Luanchri can lead to more demand of traditional luanchri for the wedding attire.

Data analysis based on the viewpoints of Community members

1. Demographics of Respondents

- Sample size : 84
- Age Groups: 36% were between 26-35 years, 29% were 18-25 and above 45 years contributed 27%
- Educational Background: Almost 70% of respondents had completed postgraduate studies, showcasing an educated demographic.




Fig.19 Chart showing the age group of respondents




Fig. 20 Chart showing different methods opted by the respondents to preserve Luanchri

2. Importance of Luanchri as a Cultural Identity

The survey reveals that 100% respondents consider the Luanchri an important part of the Gaddi cultural identity. This consensus reflects the garment's historical and symbolic significance, especially among elder members of the community, who view it as a representation of their heritage.




Fig. 21 Chart showing if the community members feel that Luanchri is an important part of our cultural identity

2. Changing Role of Luanchri

Elders providing cultural knowledge constituted 40% of the respondents. Young brides and general community members made up 50%, suggesting a broad engagement with the attire across generations.

3. Demand Trends and Modern Adaptations

A significant 72% of respondents noted an increase in demand for the Luanchri, attributed to its symbolic importance in modern Gaddi weddings. This demand is driven by both community pride and external fascination with cultural attire. However, 15% noted that demand remains stagnant due to limited knowledge about the garment among younger generations.

4. Key Changes in Design

When asked about the most significant changes in Luanchri design, respondents identified the following:

- Use of modern fabrics (30%): Incorporating materials such as polyester and synthetic blends to make the attire more affordable and accessible.
- Addition of modern embellishments (25%): Including sequins and embroidery to appeal to contemporary tastes.
- Simplified traditional motifs (20%): Reflecting changing aesthetic preferences.
- No major changes (15%): This group, primarily elders, emphasized the need for preservation.




Fig. 22 Chart showing the most significant changes in Luanchri

5. Factors Driving Changes

Respondents attributed the evolving design to multiple factors:

- Social Media and Globalization (35%): Platforms like Instagram have popularized and commodified the Luanchri
- Young Brides Adopting Modern Trends (30%): Modern influences are reshaping traditional aesthetics.
- Artisans Experimenting with Designs (20%): Reflecting market-driven innovation.




Fig. 23 Chart showing the responsible reasons for changes in Luanchri

6. Survival in Modern Times

The survey reflects optimism about the survival of the Luanchri, with 85% stating that it can endure with proper efforts. However, perspectives on its sustainability vary:

- Symbolic Artefact: 20% believe the Luanchri will only persist as a cultural symbol.
- Active Wear: 65% see its integration into modern fashion as essential for its longevity.

7. Preservation Strategies

Respondents highlighted several strategies to preserve the Luanchri:

- Increased Awareness through Media (40%): Educational campaigns and online promotion to highlight its cultural importance.
- Incorporation of Modern Styles (30%): Balancing traditional designs with modern fashion trends to attract younger generations.
- Training Younger Artisans (20%): Passing on traditional techniques to ensure skilled craftsmanship.




Fig. 23 Chart showing different methods that can help preserve Luanchri

8. Perspectives on Modern Adaptations

Respondents expressed mixed feelings about modern adaptations:

- Positive (50%): Many see adaptations as a way to keep the attire relevant.
- Neutral (35%): Support exists as long as traditional elements are preserved.
- Negative (15%): A minority perceives these changes as diluting cultural authenticity.




Fig.23 Chart showing data on the opinion of people on modern adaptations of the Luanchri

9. Recommendations for Preservation

Qualitative responses indicate actionable recommendations:

- Cultural Education Introducing the history and significance of the Luanchri in local schools.
- Wider Adoption: Encouraging its use beyond weddings, such as at festivals or official events.
- Collaborative Efforts: Partnering with designers and influencers to create modern yet authentic adaptations.

DISCUSSION

The findings show a dual narrative: the Luanchri remains an important part of Gaddi identity, but its survival depends on adjusting to modern pressures. While globalization and social media create obstacles to cultural preservation, they also provide chances for renewed interest. Creating a balance between tradition and innovation is essential. Engaging future generations in modern design and teaching may keep the garment current while still preserving its history. The evolution of the Luanchri demonstrates the dynamic relationship between cultural purity and contemporary flexibility. Collaborations with people from different field and coming up with a product line which is as per the market demand yet traditional without losing its original essence can also help maintaining the flow and continuity of gaddi bridal attire.

CONCLUSION

This study looked at the evolution of the Luanchri, a traditional bridal attire important to the Gaddi tribe's cultural identity, through the lens of industrialization and globalization. The findings illustrate the Luanchri's long-term value as a cultural icon, with the clear majority of respondents acknowledging its significance in Gaddi heritage. However, the study also focuses on the garment's developing state. From a traditional mainstay to ceremonial clothing influenced by changing cultural standards, modern aesthetics, and worldwide trends.

By documenting the experiences of Gaddi brides, elders, and community members, this study gave light on the causes influencing the evolution of the Luanchri. Key findings include the growing demand for the Luanchri at modern Gaddi weddings, which is motivated by a combination of cultural pride and external intrigue, as well as adaptive changes in design, materials, and usage that reflect both the challenges and potential of cultural preservation.

The findings reveal that while modern adaptations, such as the use of contemporary fabrics and embellishments, are viewed positively by many for their potential to sustain relevance, they also express concern about the dilution of authenticity. These findings are consistent with the broader subject of cultural preservation in the face of

globalization, stressing the tension between conserving tradition and accepting change. However, the role of the Luanchri has evolved. While it was traditionally worn as everyday attire, it is now primarily reserved for ceremonial occasions. However not limiting it to just weddings, it can also be worn in separate occasions making it seen and in the age of social media, the clicks will automatically do the promotion and awareness of this beautiful wedding attire.

The study also focuses on practical preservation initiatives, such as increasing media awareness, educating younger craftspeople, and incorporating the Luanchri into contemporary fashion. These projects demonstrate the possibility for collaboration between the community and other interested parties, such as designers and influencers, to maintain the Luanchri as a living historical treasure.

While this study adds to our understanding of the Luanchri's cultural history, it also offers up new paths for investigation. Future research should look into the economic consequences of these adjustments for craftspeople, as well as the influence of social media in influencing perceptions of traditional dress. Furthermore, longitudinal study exploring the Luanchri's role in the evolution of Gaddi identity across time should shed light on its cultural resilience.

In conclusion, the evolution of the *Luanchri* demonstrates the dynamic interplay between tradition and modernity. By establishing a balance between authenticity and innovation, the Gaddi community has the potential to retain this icon of their tradition while adapting to the demands of today. This study serves as a reminder that cultural preservation is not merely about resisting change but about embracing it thoughtfully to ensure the survival of traditions for generations to come.

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
