2. Welcome	
<p>2.1 The Chairperson, Prof. Robyn Healy, commenced the meeting by warmly welcoming all members and expressing appreciation for their dedication across time zones. She emphasised the importance of engaging in meaningful discussions on matters for the foundation.</p>	
3. Chair's Report	
<p>3.1 The Chairperson expressed the Committee's sincere appreciation for Professor Jun Li (Deputy Chair, Finance Committee) for his exceptional service and long-standing commitment to IFFTI. Professor Li has been an active participant in IFFTI's work over many years, including hosting the 2018 Annual Conference and consistently contributing to the Foundation's initiatives. The Chairperson further noted that during the AGM at the IFFTI 2026 Conference at RMIT Vietnam, IFFTI will formally acknowledge and felicitate Professor Jun Li for his distinguished contributions.</p>	
<p>3.2 Welcome Prof. Dennis Jie Sun -The Chairperson formally introduced Professor Dr Dennis Jie Sun from Donghua University, China and extended a warm welcome to him as a new member of the Executive Committee.</p>	

3.3 Collaboration with Intellect- The Chairperson, Prof. Robyn Healy, updated the Executive Committee on the ongoing discussions with Intellect. It has been confirmed that IFFTI will collaborate with Intellect for the IFFTI 2026 Conference at RMIT Vietnam, where James Campbell will deliver a publishing-focused workshop.

Prof. Robyn noted that Prof. David and Prof. Jose may wish to organise smaller, informal cluster-style sessions with postgraduate and PhD candidates. She suggested that Prof. David connect with James Campbell ahead of the conference to identify possible breakout session opportunities.

The Committee recognised that this collaboration provides a valuable pathway for conference research to progress toward journal or book publications. Prof. Carolyn noted this as an important development for IFFTI's publishing initiatives.

Prof. Robyn also shared James Campbell's interest in exploring multilingual and bilingual publishing models, particularly in the Asian region, and the potential to compile highlights from recent conferences into a publication. She further noted that James Campbell had independently reached out to IFFTI to initiate this engagement, reflecting growing interest in the Foundation's work and activities.

3.4 Distinguished Members- Prof. Robyn noted that the initiative has been successful and was well-received at the previous conference. The Chairperson noted that this is a developing initiative and that existing categories may need to be revisited.

The Committee discussed the ongoing refinement of criteria for recognising Distinguished Members, particularly in relation to individuals who have represented IFFTI but are no longer affiliated with the University through which they served. Prof. Frances Corner was referenced as an example of someone acknowledged for contributions made during her tenure at LCF, prompting consideration of whether individuals such as Prof. Jun Li should similarly be recognised.

Prof. Robyn Healy invited feedback from EC members on whether committee members who have served IFFTI for a substantial period, yet remain active in their current university roles, should be eligible for this category. Prof. Carolyn expressed support for recognizing Prof. Jun Li, noting his significant contributions to the Finance Committee and the substantial commitment required to balance IFFTI responsibilities with University duties.

The Chair emphasised the importance of refining the criteria regularly to strengthen the Committee's confidence in assessing potential candidates. Various qualifying factors will be identified, with further input invited from EC members. The Secretariat has already circulated a Google Form to the Executive Committee to gather member feedback on this category and will incorporate those responses into the updated criteria.

3.5 Hosting of Future IFFTI Annual Conference -2028/2029-

The Chairperson provided an update on the institutions that have expressed interest in hosting the IFFTI Annual Conference in 2028 or 2029. Expressions of interest have been received from:

- Hong Kong Design Institute (HKDI)
- Fashion Institute of Technology (FIT), USA
- North Carolina State University (NCSU), USA

Formal submission from NCSU, USA, is still pending, and the Secretariat will follow up to request their proposal.

She further invited Expressions of Interest from Executive Committee members to join the selection panel, clarifying that representatives from the Institutions sharing their EOI are not eligible to serve.

Prof. David Zajtmann confirmed his willingness to join the committee. Prof. Liz, Dr Circe and Prof. Jose Teunissen also expressed interest. The Chair remarked that members from different regions would be great to ensure diversity of perspectives.

3.6 Outreach Membership - The Chairperson reaffirmed IFFTI's commitment to the Outreach Membership initiative. She noted that KNUST, Ghana, will complete its three-year Outreach Membership term in December 2025, after which it will transition to Associate Membership. IFFTI will therefore identify a new institution to nominate for the next outreach cycle.

The Committee discussed potential regions to prioritise, with Dr Circe suggesting institutions in Latin America, particularly Argentina, may be suitable. The Chairperson also highlighted opportunities in the Pacific region, mentioning universities in Fiji, where outreach



support could have a meaningful impact. Prof Margo and Dr Circe expressed support for exploring these options. It was agreed that South America and the Pacific will be the primary regions under consideration. Prof Margo and the Chairperson will coordinate further to identify appropriate institutions for recommendation. EC members can share their suggestions as well.

3.7 Deputy Chair- Finance Sub-Committee- The Chairperson invited expressions of interest for the role of Deputy Chair of the Finance Sub-Committee, noting that the current Chair, Ms Aditi, provides strong leadership and support for the position. She also outlined plans to expand the Sub-Committee by inviting additional members to join.

Members expressing interest were encouraged to contact the IFFTI Secretariat, who will coordinate responses and follow-up and otherwise call out for EOI from EC. The Chairperson reiterated the importance of maintaining strong financial oversight and proper records, given the critical role of the committee, despite formal accounting and audit mechanisms already in place.

4. Update on Membership Sub-Committee

4.1 Prof.Margo shared a detailed presentation on the Membership Sub-Committee. (**Enclosure 1**)

4.1.1 Potential New Members- An email was sent by the Chairperson to Non-IFFTI members Institute, who had submitted an abstract for the IFFTI Conference 2026. Curtin University in Australia and Leeds University in the UK were identified as potential universities to engage with. There is hope for additional responses from those who have requested further information.

4.1.2 Ecole Duperre - IFFTI Logo on their website: Prof. Margo noted that École Duperee, which is not a member of IFFTI, is displaying the IFFTI logo on their website. The IFFTI Secretariat has sent multiple emails requesting the removal of the logo. Prof. Margo requested that Prof. David supports reaching out to École Duperee. Prof. David acknowledged this request and would update on the same.

4.1.3 Laura shared to reach out to Queensland University of Technology, Australia, regarding IFFTI membership.

5. Presentation on the 2026 IFFTI Annual Conference at RMIT University, Vietnam

Ms.Corinna shared an overview presentation on the status of preparations for the IFFTI 2026 Conference. A copy of the same is placed in **Enclosure 2**.

6. Update on Finance Sub-Committee

6.1 Ms. Aditi Srivastava provided an update on the IFFTI Finance Sub-Committee:

6.2 Payment made to LCF UK for Conference Support Fee (Full) and 4 Gala Dinners for Distinguished Members and Marco V. Garrido-Félix from Universidad de Monterrey, México.

6.3 Payment made to RMIT University, Vietnam - Advance Conference Support Fee.

6.4 Under the IFFTI Exchange Initiative (Cycle 1, 2025)

Ann Cantrell - Payment has been made to FIT USA.

Home Institution - FIT, USA

Host Institution - University of Boras, Sweden.

6.5. Ms. Aditi confirmed that everything is under control and that they are diligently following up on the IFFTI Subscription fees, which are due. Additionally, she offered to assist Ms. Surbhi with matters related to the Arch College of Design & Business, as she has a connection with Ms. Archana Surana and can facilitate communication with her if required.

7. Update on Research Sub-Committee

7.1 IFFTI India Chapter-NIFT India (12th September 2025) - Prof. David informed the Committee that a Regional meeting organised by the IFFTI India Chapter took place on 12th September 2025 at NIFT India, focusing on designing a sustainable, smart, and skill-oriented future. The event saw significant participation from attendees across India, generating a wealth of detailed feedback. This feedback is expected to be instrumental in shaping the Conference themes for the upcoming year in 2027, indicating a positive and dynamic outlook for future meetings.

7.2 Europe Workshop: Advancing Education & Research in the Fashion Industry-Manchester Metropolitan University, UK (14th November 2025)- Prof. David reported on the Regional Meeting in Europe, co-organised with Prof. Jose, which successfully merged the Education and Research sub-committees for a joint programme. Attendees were invited to present papers, generating strong engagement and positive feedback. Presentations explored the relationship between research and teaching, including projects from institutions in the Netherlands, Spain, shared industry collaboration, and a session by Ms. Caroline Ardelet (IFM) on innovative pedagogical methods. A presentation on the challenges posed by AI for educators was also highlighted. The meeting was well received overall, with a visit from Manchester Metropolitan University and a tour of the Robotics Living Lab contributing to the event's success.

Prof. David announced that ISEM Madrid, Spain, will host the next event. Prof. David expressed gratitude for a delightful dinner organised by Manchester Metropolitan University, UK and acknowledged Prof. Liz and her team for their hospitality.

7.3 IFFTI Postgrad Conference proposed by Mary-Ann Ball, NTU UK - Prof David highlighted a proposal received for an IFFTI post-graduate Conference planned for July 2026 by Mary Ann Ball from NTU, UK. This Conference aims to involve post-graduate and PhD students. The event will be hosted at Nottingham Trent University, UK, with no registration fee for attendees and open to IFFTI and non-IFFTI members.

Prof. David initiated a discussion by raising key questions regarding the IFFTI accreditation for the Conference.

Prof. Liz commended the initiative and noted that rising submission quality for the main conference makes it timely to consider how IFFTI supports postgraduate researchers. Her main concern was that hosting a separate conference may detract from the strength of the main event of IFFTI. She emphasised the need for a sustainable model, with clarity on future hosts, and suggested that a more effective approach may be to integrate a dedicated postgraduate component—such as a doctoral day—within the main conference, providing structured presentations and constructive feedback for doctoral students. Prof. Liz believes there are many positive aspects to this idea, but suggests integrating it into the main IFFTI conference schedule.

The Chairperson raised concerns about the use of “IFFTI” in the title of the proposed Postgraduate Conference. She noted that the initiative had not originated from within IFFTI and questioned the implications of positioning IFFTI as part of the conference title rather than simply as a supporter. She emphasised that using the IFFTI name implies organisational responsibility, including handling participant queries or issues, and may misrepresent the level of IFFTI's involvement. The Chair asked the Committee to consider why the IFFTI name is needed, what value it adds, and what commitment it signals before any approval is given.

Prof. José agreed with the concerns raised, noting that while the IFFTI network is valuable, the proposed conference does not necessarily require an IFFTI “stamp.” She suggested that a more suitable model may be a postgraduate or mini-conference held alongside the main IFFTI event as practised by others, and questioned the need for IFFTI's name to headline an initiative that did not originate within the organisation.

Ms Aditi agreed with the concerns raised, noting that the IFFTI conference is a well-established asset with defined standards. She stated that if a postgraduate conference is to be pursued, the Executive Committee must determine a clear and appropriate framework for it.

The Chairperson clarified that the proposed postgraduate conference cannot be presented as an IFFTI-led event, as it did not originate from the Committee, and using “IFFTI” in the title could mislead members and imply responsibilities not agreed upon. She stressed the need for transparency, alignment with member expectations, and early communication of any initiatives using the IFFTI

banner. While a limited form of support—such as access to the IFFTI network or logo—may be considered, it must not misrepresent the event as an official IFFTI conference. She also highlighted the risks of engaging without clarity on fees, expectations, or positioning, noting that IFFTI, as a member organisation, must be transparent and ensure all initiatives are communicated properly, especially at the AGM.

7.4 IFFTI Developmental Session (19th September 2025)-

Prof. David reported on a successful developmental session, an online workshop for authors with accepted abstracts, similar to previous years, which included over 80 participants. He expressed optimism for producing excellent papers and thanked reviewers for their upcoming contributions.

8. Update on the Education Initiative Sub-Committee -Prof. José shared positive feedback on the Europe Regional Workshop, noting that it was the first time the Education and Research Sub-Committees collaborated closely. She highlighted the success of this joint approach and suggested it could be considered again in the future where appropriate. The workshop effectively explored research-informed education, industry collaboration, and practice-based learning across different educational contexts.

8.1 IFFTI Developmental Session (26th September 2025) - Prof. José reported on the Developmental Session held on 26 September 2025, which attracted approximately 45 participants. The session focused on practice-based creative research, including equipment requirements and practical approaches to realising creative work. It received positive feedback, particularly from participants, who found it valuable in understanding what is feasible for developing and exhibiting their creative practice.

8.2 Update on Proposed Online Session Dedicated to AI for IFFTI Members in January 2026:

Prof. José updated the Committee on preparations for an online AI-focused panel session for IFFTI members planned for early 2026. Prof. José, John, and Jurrie will finalise the session format and speakers, drawing on prior discussions and expressions of interest from faculty across IFFTI member institutions. Further details will be shared once confirmed.

Ms. Aditi expressed interest in contributing, highlighting Pearl Academy's work in integrating AI into its curriculum. This was welcomed as a valuable global perspective.

The Chairperson advised consideration of academic calendars, particularly in January, and it was noted that the session may be scheduled in February to maximise participation. Prof. Robyn Healy also noted the presence of a strong AI research Centre at RMIT Vietnam that could be explored for collaboration. Prof. José expressed interest in developing educational workshops there, drawing on the success of previous initiatives such as the ESWA workshop, which effectively fostered discussion and community engagement.

8.3 Update on IAF: Prof. Jose provided an update on the IAF, noting the interest generated by Mathias's presentation at the previous IFFTI conference at LCF. She also shared that a significant conference was held in October with ITMF (Federation of spinners and weavers), where the new IAF president identified education as one of the key focus areas. Prof Jose emphasised the need to enhance collaboration between industry and education globally.

The Chairperson and Prof. José discussed the potential for IAF engagement at the IFFTI 2026 Conference in Vietnam, noting Vietnam's position as a major global manufacturing hub. It was suggested that inviting IAF representatives, including the new IAF President, could be mutually beneficial and help strengthen collaboration between industry and education. Both noted that such engagement could open opportunities for shared interest in conference papers and broader industry–academic dialogue.

8.4 Update from the Education & Research Committee:

Prof. José shared a brief update on the IFFTI Exchange Initiative, noting that three exchanges have been awarded and completed under the first cycle of 2025. Two additional exchanges remain to be awarded in the current year, with the next application cycle closing on 15 December. It was noted that most participants have submitted their reports, which are published on the IFFTI website. Prof. David commented on the improved quality of submissions, highlighting that the reports were comprehensive, well-documented, and thoughtfully presented, reflecting the strengthening impact of the initiative.

9. IFFTI Website use of Member Institutions Photography/Imagery Prof.Liz Barnes (Deputy Chair): Prof. Liz Barnes provided an update on the initiative to refresh the IFFTI website using photography contributed by member institutions. She noted that a call for submissions was issued along with clear guidelines to ensure appropriate usage and due diligence. Eight member institutions have submitted photography, which has been reviewed and shared by the Secretariat. Prof. Liz is currently assessing how best to integrate the images, supported by a mock-up prepared by the Secretariat, and noted that the initiative will enhance the visual quality and keep the website current.

9.1 Prof. Liz discussed updates regarding brand guidelines, which have been shared with all members. She acknowledged a suggestion from John to improve the guidelines and plans to incorporate it without requiring extensive further discussion. Prof. Liz intends to update and circulate the revised guidelines via email, seeking consensus on adopting the changes without a formal reissue to members. She expressed gratitude for John's suggestion.

10. Additional Point

Prof Robyn, the Chairperson, noted that the meeting had progressed efficiently and invited members to share any additional updates from their institutions or any other points.

10.1 Dr Helen announced a virtual talk scheduled for November 25th, focusing on Ann Cantrell's IFFTI exchange visit to the University of Boras, Sweden. The presentation includes insights from the visit, meetings, and photographs. The event will take place at 1:00 PM Eastern Time. All participants are encouraged to join, and registration details have been shared with the Secretariat. It was confirmed that it will post the announcement on the IFFTI website and social media platforms. It received positive feedback from EC members.

10.2 Dr.Circe shared an update on her forthcoming research focused on the Global Tropics, examining place-based design practices and climate-responsive fashion systems across the equatorial belt, including Africa, Southeast Asia, and Latin America, as an alternative to Western seasonal models. She announced a "Global Tropics" conference, organised in collaboration with the Museum at FIT and supported by a research grant from La Salle, to be held in Singapore on 20–21 January 2026. This event marks the pilot conference, aiming to prioritise the voices of regional designers and theorists.

11. The Chair thanked everyone for their contribution and declared the meeting closed.




